"But it's not just about flexibility. I know it sounds corny, but as his primary carer, I also need interaction with adults, and this is a great place to find that"

As a main carer, Amelia rarely has time off but seeing live music remains one of her passions, when she can find the time.

"I'm glad that my younger sister still thinks I'm cool enough to go to gigs with," she confess, with some relief.

Amelia's last gig was Lizzo in Birmingham, but
